




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ABOUT US

A MESSAGE FROM

THE EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR & BOARD PRESIDENT

We are pleased to share our 2021 Annual Report from the New Art Center. In reflection, 2021 can be best summed up as the year of vascilation. With the constant shifting of protocols and policies related to masking, vaccine mandates, and social distancing, COVID-19 kept us on our toes for yet another 365 days.

Even with the policy shifts, New Art resumed a normal cadence of classes and programs, and we saw a steady stream of returning students and families. Although we still have not reached prepandemic enrollments, we reengaged 619 returning students to New Art while 849 joined us as first time students. Moreover, our geographic center continued to widen, and we added 14 new zipcodes in 2021. Support from the Employee Retention Tax Credits, part of the federal stimulus, helped us stem our loss of revenue.

With the day-to-day concerns about organizational survival behind us, the New Art board was able to get back to the business of planning for New Art's future. We approved a new set of Strategic Goals that put diversity, equity, inclusion and access at the core of all our work and set benchmarks to hold ourselves accountable. As part of our process, we also recruited and onboarded the largest and most diverse Board of Governors in our 44 year history.

In total we expanded:

- -Our multicultural programming, including developing a series of free community cultural days.
- -The geography of our scholarship program.
- -Our scholarship program to provide support for 19 (up from 12 last year) with 26 scholarships. 50% of these students were referred to us by the Card-to-Culture program.
- Our donor base with a new Membership program adding 154 first time donors to our ranks.
- Our staff in order to keep our facility open 7 days a week. In turn, this allowed us to expand programming as well as bring back event rentals and birthday parties.
- Our professional development training to include 100+ hours of inclusive teaching practice for all faculty and staff.



In addition, we also began the process of exploring a future home for the New Art Center, and we entered into an Option to Negotiate the purchase of the Church of the Open Word in Newtonville. which we expect would give us room to expand our programs and services in a more visible, centrally located facility in Newtonville.

All in all, while 2021 left us with policy whiplash, we are pleased to have ended the year in a sustainable position, well poised for future growth.

We are so grateful to our students, donors, faculty, staff and Board of Governors for the collective support of our mission and belief in New Art as a safe and welcoming community.

IN OUR COMMUNITY

COMMUNITY ART PROGRAMS

New Art Center offered 136 hours of free expressive arts therapy classes to young adults with developmental disabilities, women and families healing from domestic violence, and young adults with learning disabilities. We partnered with Brigham House and the Clearway School to provide both space and programs to their communities. We utilized the Trio classroom space for these classes.

NEWTONVILLE VILLAGE DAY

Our booth at Newtonville Village Day was a hit! With our custom button making station and chalk mural, over 600 local residents participated in the day-long event. Our sidewalk mural was designed by our high school volunteers and executed by members of our staff and community.

SATELLITE GALLERIES

Our Satellite Gallery program curates and installs exhibitions by our faculty, students, and community members in local businesses. This program supports our operating costs, and builds recognition for our programs, faculty, and students. In return, these businesses support local artists and stimulate economic growth. In 2021, we partnered with BerryDunn, Brookline Bank, and Freedman Healthcare to decorate their office spaces with beautiful and unique work.

JUNETEENTH

New Art Center held a free public event led by Artist and Educator Annette McCarty on Saturday, June 19th. Community members participated in creating a community mural and enjoyed a performance by Choice McCarty in a celebration of freedom, commemorating the end of slavery in the United States.



DÍA DE LOS MUERTOS

Our Free Family Days were shifted to Community Cultural Days and highlighted festivals, holidays, and celebrations from the many cultures represented in our community. Our first day was Día de los Muertos which featured craft activities, a musical performance, dancing, and traditional sweet rolls and desserts. We welcomed approximately 300 people into the Main Gallery on October 31.

NEW @ NEW ART

OFFICIALLY BECAME A SUMMER CAMP

In 2021 New Art's summer vacation program became an officially licensed camp! Our efforts paid off, and 2021 was our most successful summer ever, with a record 895 students enrolled in summer camp and adult classes.

LAUNCHED MEMBERSHIP

June 2021 welcomed a new way for students and donors to support New Art. Our membership program offered multiple levels to give to the New Art Center and in return receive early access to classes, discounts on classes and event rentals, and numerous other benefits for artists.



The New Art Center's new, tiered membership program is mutually beneficial for students and New Art! Launched in June 2021, more than 150 students joined us a members, saving an average of 10% off classes and programs. Moreover, New Art Membership is a gateway for people of all ages to continue to discover, question, learn about, and appreciate art.



CLASSES & WORKSHOPS

Throughout the year we offered children, teens, and adults in-depth, comprehensive art classes and workshops taught by experienced local artists both in-person and live online via Zoom. Mediums offered to all expereince levels included drawing, painting, ceramics, encaustic painting, and fiber arts, among others. Workshops allow students to try a medium, technique, or subject matter in four sessions or less.

This year's new classes reflect New Art's commitment to diversity, equity, inclusion, and access as we worked to bring a global perspective to our programs with teaching practices applicable for all learners. Our Art & Wine events continued with offerings from Italy and Mexico, and we welcomed 10 artists for Artist Talks. We have transformed our free Family Drop-In Days into Community Cultural Days in order to celebrate the diversity of Newton.

BIPOC CURATORIAL PROGRAM

The New Art Center's BIPOC (Black, Indigenous, People of Color) Curatorial Program is designed to offer the opportunity for guest curators of color to curate exhibitions. This program enables curators who identify as Black, Indigenous, and People of Color to develop and share exhibitions that spark dialogue, and share personal vision and personal experiences through curation. We hosted our first in-person BIPOC Curatorial Program exhibition, Women in Abstraction, curated by Destiny Palmer. This was our second exhibition in this series.

WOMEN IN ABSTRACTION

Women in Abstraction, curated by Destiny Palmer, was the first in-person and virtual exhibition in New Art's BIPOC Curatorial Program. Abstraction has recently been examined through a more critical historical lens as documents reveal the disparities left out of many conversations. The New Art Center sought abstract works that engaged in gender, race, class and history as it relates to abstraction. We invited artists to submit work that helps to push and provoke dialogues about abstraction throughout history.

CREATIVE PROCESS

Dates: June 17 - July 31, 2021

The Andrew & Jean Dibner Annual Student and Faculty Show featured explorations of paint, pastels, ceramics, and more through a colorful lens. This year we held two of these annual exhibitions to show the New Art Center's diverse community of artists as they come together and connect through their art. Each exhibition showcased a dynamic range of mediums and themes expressed by our students and faculty across all ages.


Creative Process 2020 (postponed from Summer 2020)

Dates: September 13 - October 1, 2021


Creative Process 2021 Dates: November 15 - January 3, 2021

New Art launched an immersive virtual reality exhibition for Women in Abstraction, Creative Process 2020, and Creative Process 2021 reaching over 240 views since the launch in June.










